


Peacemakers

- Original hearers: "Blessed are the peace-makers"
- Response: You're crazy.
- essentially, the same story about quoting the Sermon on the Mount, parenthetically, in their preaching "turn the other cheek" [and] to have someone come up after to say, "Where did you get those liberal talking points?" And what was alarming to me is that in most of these scenarios, when the pastor would say, "I'm literally quoting Jesus Christ," the response would not be, "I apologize." The response would be, "Yes, but that doesn't work anymore. That's weak." And when we get to the point where the teachings of Jesus himself are seen as subversive to us, then we're in a crisis. (Russell Moore)
- Peacemaking is a radical and counter-cultural idea!



Why does peace need to be made?

- Sin in the world affects relationships. [selfishness, hatred, slander, malice, deceit, envy, strife, arrogance, boasting, lack of mercy, discord, jealousy, fits of rage, selfish ambition, dissensions, factions].
- Mis-communication (Tower of Babel).
- I have no peace, no quietness; I have no rest, but only turmoil." (Job 3:26)

We have a strong city; God makes salvation its walls and ramparts. Open the gates that the righteous nation may enter, the nation that keeps faith. You will keep in perfect peace those whose minds are steadfast, because they trust in you. (Isa 26:2-4)



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

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

Peacemakers in the Bible

But the wisdom that comes from heaven is first of all pure; then peaceloving, considerate, submissive, full of mercy and good fruit, impartial and sincere.

Peacemakers who sow in peace reap a harvest of righteousness (Jas. 3:17-18)

- What do we get from the "sowing" and "reaping" metaphor?
- Deliberate action/ takes time / No results at the beginning.
- The end result (harvest) is much greater than the initial action (sowing seeds).
- Jesus used sowing and reaping quite often in his teaching.
- Link between "wisdom" and "peace-making". How does this work?
- But the meek will inherit the land and enjoy peace and prosperity. (Ps 37:11)

Peacemaking



The story of the Bible is:

Chaos + God => Peace (Eden)
Fallen world + Jesus Follower => Peace

Peacemaking

- Now peacemaking is a divine work. For peace means reconciliation, and God is the author of peace and of reconciliation. Indeed, the very same verb which is used in this Beatitude of us is applied by the apostle Paul to what God has done through Christ. Through Christ God was pleased 'to reconcile to himself all things . . . making peace through his blood, shed on the cross'. And Christ's purpose was to 'create in himself one new humanity out of the two, thus making peace'. It is hardly surprising, therefore, that the particular blessing which attaches to peacemakers is that they will be called children of God. For they are seeking to do what their Father has done, loving people with his love, as Jesus is soon to make explicit. [Stott]

- Peacemaking as a divine work of reconciliation.

Called children of God.

- Peacemakers are blessed because they will be called "sons of God"—
 not "children of God," as in the King James Version. The difference is
 slight, but significant. In Jewish thought, "son" often bears the
 meaning "partaker of the character of," or the like. If someone calls
 you the "son of a dog," this is not an aspersion on your parents, but
 on you: you partake of the character of a dog. Thus, "son of God" may
 have a different connotation than "child of God." Both expressions
 can refer to some sort of filial relationship; but the former has more
 emphasis on character than position. (Carson)
- Being in a new kind of family. Born of God (Jn 1:13)
- If you were Abraham's children," said Jesus, "then you would do what Abraham did. (Jn 8:30-47)

But what about this?

- Do not suppose that I have come to bring peace to the earth. I did not come to bring peace, but a sword. For I have come to turn "a man against his father, a daughter against her mother, a daughter-in-law against her mother-in-law —a man's enemies will be the members of his own household. (Mt 10:34-36)
- So, Jesus, which is it? Peace, or sword? How to approach this?
- May have to modify our idea of peace to bring it line with Jesus' idea of peace.
- The gospel brings peace with God but can create enemies on earth.
- Jesus is saying that allegiance to him is core to discipleship, even if it creates division with others. Look at what happened to Jesus!
- The family example drives home the point for his followers.
- Jesus goes on later to teach how to treat those enemies.

NT Living

- Make every effort to live in peace with everyone and to be holy; without holiness no one will see the Lord. (Heb 12:14)
- If it is possible, as far as it depends on you, live at peace with everyone. (Rom 12:14)
- Whoever would love life and see good days must keep their tongue from evil and their lips from deceitful speech. They must turn from evil and do good; they must seek peace and pursue it. (1 Pet 3:10-11).
 - A lot to do with the tongue : gossip, false witness, deceitful speech, slander
- We are talking about living a life that intentionally and deliberately seeks to establish peace in our relationships, as far as it is possible from our side.
- But the meek will inherit the land and enjoy peace and prosperity. (Ps 37:11) sound familiar?
